

the ceremony.


Inducting the graduands, the Acting Registrar/CEO of MLSCN, Dr. Donald Ibe Ofili, reiterated the Council's mandate to ensure the highest standards in education and professional practice for Medical Laboratory Science in Nigeria. He noted that graduates from institutions with lapsed accreditation would no longer be recognized for induction until full accreditation status is restored.


Taking ceremonies for their graduating students as soon as their results are approved by the University Senate.


Reengineering Nigeria's Tax System: A Critical Call To Action

rofessor Bariyima David Kiabel has advocated for a diminished reliance on federal allocations to bolster the tax initiatives of States and Local Government Areas. This recommendation was made during the delivery of the 115th Inaugural Lecture of the Rivers State University, held on Wednesday, 30th July 2025, in the University's Senate Chamber, titled "Reengineering the Tax System: So Much Hunting, Too Little Catch."

In his insightful lecture, Professor Kiabel emphasized Nigeria's pressing revenue mobilization dilemma, highlighting the nation's dismally low tax-to-GDP ratio of approximately 6–8 per cent. He pinpointed structural and operational deficiencies, including pervasive corruption, lack of transparency, and inadequate accountability, as critical factors that erode public trust and deter voluntary tax compliance. Stressing the necessity for reform, he proclaimed: "Our nation's economic growth and development hinge significantly on our ability to effectively mobilize domestic resources."

Prof. Kiabel, a former Director of the Entrepreneurship Development Centre, spotlighted corruption as a fundamental impediment to Nigeria's tax revenue



collection. He argued that the modest tax yield can be traced back to corrupt practices perpetrated by tax officials, government representatives, and even taxpayers themselves.

He characterized corruption as "a form of dishonesty or a criminal offence undertaken by a person or an organization entrusted with authority to acquire illicit benefits or abuse power for personal gain." Drawing from the Anti-Corruption Law of the Federal Republic of Nigeria (2000), he delineated corruption to include bribery, the misuse of one's office for pecuniary advantage, gratification, influence peddling, and insincerity in counsel for personal benefit.

This "cankerworm," he asserted, is deeply entrenched within the nation, exerting catastrophic effects on tax revenue. "Corruption frequently results in tax leakages and can manifest in the non-remittance of accurately collected taxes by officials, as well as in the diversion and extortion of payments," he stated.

Professor Kiabel stressed that tax payment constitutes a legal obligation, referencing Section 24(f) of the 1999 Constitution (as amended): "It shall be the duty of every citizen to declare his income honestly to

appropriate and lawful agencies and pay his tax promptly." He also posited that tax payment embodies a spiritual obligation, invoking biblical teachings: "Render, therefore, unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's" (Matthew 22:21).

The inaugural lecturer concluded with a compelling recommendation for the government to implement robust measures aimed at curtailing tax evasion and fortifying

the nation's fiscal capacity.

In his address, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, Professor Isaac Zeb-Obipi, extolled Professor Kiabel as "an erudite scholar of all time." Represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Valentine Omubo-Pepple, the Vice-Chancellor commended the lecturer's astute presentation and reaffirmed the University's commitment to cultivating exceptional academic minds that uphold

RSU's esteemed reputation within Africa's higher education landscape.

Emphasizing key points from the lecture, Professor Zeb-Obipi noted the perils of overreliance on federal allocations by State and Local Governments, as well as the deleterious impact of excessive exemptions and inefficient tax incentives, which create loopholes through which billions in tax revenue are forfeited annually.

RSU Reaffirms Commitment to Innovation and Partnerships



VC Appoints Mr. David Lambert as Acting Principal of ISS

Mr. David Lambert as the Acting Principal of
the International Secondary School (ISS),
Rivers State University.


The Vice-Chancellor who announced the appointment of the Acting Principal during a meeting with Principal Officers, the Management Committee and staff of the International Secondary School, charged Mr. Lambert to raise the bar of excellence and ensure the growth of the school, particularly in attracting more students for admission.

Until His appointment which took effect from Tuesday, 5th August 2025, David Lambert was Chief Master at the International Secondary School (ISS), a position he held from July, 2012 to August, 2025.

Pastor David Lambert began his educational journey at Sacred Heart State School I, Diobu, Port Harcourt, where he obtained his First School Leaving Certificate in 1976. He proceeded to Government Secondary School, Okehi Etche, Rivers State, earning his West African School Certificate in 1992. He holds a Bachelor of Arts (Hons.) degree in Fine Arts (Art Education) from Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria, in 1992; a Master of

Arts degree in Law and Diplomacy from Rivers State University (2013); and is currently pursuing a Ph.D. in Law and Diplomacy.

He is a registered teacher with the Teachers Registration Council of Nigeria and a member of the Nigerian Institute of Public Relations (NIPR) and the Society of Nigerian Artists (SNA). David Lambert joined the International Secondary School, Rivers State University, as Master I in 2000, and rose through the ranks: Senior Master II (2001–2005); Senior Master I (2005–2010); Principal Master (2010–2012) and Chief Master (from July 2012 to August 2025).

An innovative educator, he has pioneered several initiatives in the school, including founding the Model United Nations Club, through which he has taken ISS and other high school students to the United Nations since 2015. He established the "We the People – Project Citizen Club," with which he has travelled with ISS students to several countries. He is Patron of the Press Club, Literary and Debating Society, and Environment Club. He has served as Chairman of the School Disciplinary Rules and Regulations Committee as well as the Appointments and Promotions Committee.

David Lambert has been active in alumni leadership, serving as National Vice-President (South-South) of the Ahmadu Bello University Alumni Association (2015–2022), National Assistant Secretary-General (2010–2015), Vice-Chairman of the Rivers State Branch (2008–2022), and Secretary of the Rivers State Branch (1996–2008).

In addition to his academic and administrative work, David Lambert is the Assistant Resident Pastor (Cell System) at Gateway International Church Headquarters, Rumuolumeni, Port Harcourt.


